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## CORRECTIONS FOR BOOK 13

If you have not already put the corrections in your Book 13, please do so now.

APRON for Knit Bo-Peep was omitted. It is: Starting at bottom, cast on 40 sts.

Knit 3 rows. Keep first & last 3 sts in garter st & work sts between in stock. st for about 3".

Next Row: K 3, k 2 tog to last 3, k 3.

Cast on 24, bind off ALL sts, cast on 24, bind these off also - apron ties made.

Break yarn & embroider flowers as shown.

### Knit Queen of Hearts

Page 18: After Rows 9 & 10 of sleeve, the next 2 rows are:

With white, k 2 tog across, then p 2 tog back, 10 sts. Continue with pattern.

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Page 19: Row 3 should read:

Row 3: 2 white, \*2 red, 1 white, 2 red, 3 white, rpt from\* across, end with 2 white.

## CROCHETED BABY DOLL OUTFIT

AND variations for other dolls also

Pattern begins on page 6

Sent to me by Mrs. C. Victory of Tahlequah, Okla. She put in this note to me:

"Virginia, this is one of my treasured old patterns so I had it copied for you to keep. I have used all weights of thread & various size hooks to fit various size dolls. Even sewing thread & #14 hook for tiny baby dolls. I hope you enjoy it".

Thank you, Mrs. Victory, & I am sure we all will enjoy it. Knitters also can benefit by reading the possibilities & variations.

MATERIALS are given according to doll size.

Note: Gauge in shells is measured from dc

st. to dc st.

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11½" girl teen doll: Shown in almost long nightgown(I ran out of thread). Use very fine crochet thread & #11 hook to give you a gauge of 2 shell patterns per inch. I used the Sacque for this. The only difference basically in the dress & sacque is this: the dress opens down the back & is joined below the armholes. The Sacque is open down the front & has a few more shells below armhole to make it a little larger.

22" Baby/Toddler doll: Knitting Worsted or 2 strands smaller yarn & Size G Hook to give gauge of 3 shells per 4 inches. Shown on doll is the dress, without edgings or sleeves, booties without top shells on them.

### CROCHETED DRESS

YOKE: Row 1: Using white, ch 57, turn, 1 hdc in 3rd st from hook, 1 hdc in each of the remaining sts of ch (56 hdc in row). In working the following rows pick up the back loop of each st to form ridge, ch 2, turn.

Row 2: \*1 hdc in each of the next 3 sts, 2 hdc in next st, rpt from\* 12 times more, then work even to end of row (69 hdc).

Row 3: Work even in hdc, ch 2, turn.

Row 4: Like row 2, increasing 16 sts on row (85 hdc), ch 2, turn.

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Row 5: Inc in every 5th st, Increasing 16 sts in row (101 hdc). This completes yoke.

Ch 3, turn & work in pattern st as follows: (work in both loops now, not just back loop).

Pattern Row 1: Sk 1 st, \*(2 dc, ch 1, 2 dc) in next st, sk 1 st, 1 dc in next st, sk 1 st, rpt from\* across row, end with 1 dc. Ch 3, turn (26 dc & 25 shells in row).

Pattern Row 2: \*(2 dc, ch 1, 2 dc) in center of shell, 1 dc in next single dc, rpt from\* across row (26 dc & 25 shells in row). Ch 3, turn. Rpt Row 2 for pattern st, also working as follows:

Row 3: Divide work for sleeves, work 4 shell patterns, skip 5 shell patterns (for sleeve hole) work 7 shell patterns, skip 5 shell

patterns, work last 4 shell patterns. Ch 3, turn (15 patterns in row).

Row 4: Work across first 4 patterns sts, ending with a shell, ch 1, 1 dc between shells at underarm, ch 1, shell in next shell, work in pattern st across next 6 pattern (ending with a shell), ch 1, dc between shells at underarm, ch 1, shell in next shell & continue in pattern st across back (15 shells, 16 dc in row) ch 3, turn.

Row 5: Work across next 4 pattern sts, making the dc of last pattern in the ch-1 of previous row, a shell in top of the single dc of underarm, 1 dc in the ch-1 of previous row, work in pattern across next 7 pattern sts to next ch-1 underarm, 1 dc in the ch-1 shell in next single dc underarm, 1 dc in next ch-1, work in pattern across remaining 4 patterns of row (17 shells, 18 dc in row). Join to the top ch-3 at beginning of row. This joins the skirt together. Ch 3.

Row 6: Work around in pattern; at end of rnd join with a sl st to the top of the turning ch-3. This joins skirt together. (17 shells, 18 dc in rnd).

Rnd 7: Ch 3, sk first dc, shell in shell, continue around in pattern; at end of rnd skip last dc & join with a sl st to the top of the first ch-3.

Rnd 8: Ch 3, work around in pattern; at end of rnd join with a sl st to the top of the

first ch-3.

Rnds 9,10,11,12: Like Rnd 8. Fasten off white.

Rnd 13: Join pink in last sl st made. \*In next shell make 2 dc, p (for picot, ch 3 & sc in first st of ch), 2 dc, then make 1 sc in next dc, rpt from\* around. Join with sl st, fasten off.

Sleeve: Attach white at underarm in the single dc, ch 3, work around in pattern (7 shells & 6 dc in rnd). Join with sl st to the top of the first ch-3. Work 1 more rnd of the same.

Next rnd: Ch 4, \*1 dc in ch-1 of shell, ch 1, 1 dc in next (single) dc, rpt from\* around, join with a sl st to the ch-4. Fasten off white.

Make other sleeve to correspond.

Neck edging: Property of Ms. Virginia Lakin, NOT FOR RESALE Holding right side of work toward you, join pink \*ch 3 for picot, skip 2 sts, sc in next st, rpt from\* around neck edge, fasten off.

Work same edging around lower edge of each sleeve.

With white make two small button loops on back of left yoke. Attach buttons on right yoke. Run baby ribbon through the open sts at lower edge of each sleeve. Trim yoke with bow.

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#### CROCHETED SACQUE

YOKE: See directions for Yoke in Crocheted Dress & work as follows: Start & work first three rows same as for dress.

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Row 4: Work in hdc, increasing in every 3rd st, 22 times(91 sts in row). Ch 2, turn.

Row 5: Like row 4, but increasing in every 5th st (18 increases);109 sts. Ch 3, turn.

Pattern Row 1: Same as dress but having 27 shells & 28 dc in row.

Row 3: Divide work for sleeves as follows: Work 5 shells, skip 5 shells, work 7 shells, skip 5 shells, work 5 shells --remember that 1 dc goes between each shell,except when you are skipping sts for sleeves.

Row 4: Work across in pattern (17 shells & 18 dc in row). Ch 3, turn.

Rows 5,6 & 7: Like row 4. Fasten off.

Sleeves: Join wool in top of the single dc at underarm, ch 3 & work around in pattern, at end of rnd join with a sl st to the top of the first ch-3 made; 7 shells & 7 dc (counting the ch-3 as a dc) in rnd. Work 2 more rnds the same and fasten off.

Next Rnd: Join white in the single dc underarm & make 1 sc,\*make 5 dc over the ch-1 of shell, 1 sc in next dc, rpt from\* around.Join with a sl st & fasten off.

Neck edge: Holding the right side of work toward you,join pink wool at neck edge,ch 4,\*sk 1 st, 1 dc in next st, rpt from\* across, end with a dc in last st. Fasten off.

Trimming: Join white to top of left front & work in sc down front,keeping work flat.Then

work shells across the bottom, same as shells on sleeve, making 2 sc in the end dc to turn. Then continue in sc along other front & along neck edge to starting point & fasten off.

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### CROCHETED BONNET

Starting with crown, ch 19, 1 hdc in 3rd st from hook, 1 hdc in each of the remaining 16 sts of chain (18 hdc). Ch 1, turn.

Row 1: 1 sc, \*1 hdc in each of next 15 sts\*, 5 hdc over end of ch, rpt from\* to\* down other side of ch, 2 sc, ch 1, turn. 39 sts.

Row 2: 1 sc, \*1 hdc in each of next 15 sts\*, 2 hdc in each of next 5 sts, rpt from\* to\* once, 2 sc, ch 1, turn; 44 sts.

Row 3: 1 sc, \*1 hdc in each of next 15 sts\*, (2 hdc in next st, 1 hdc in next st) 5 times, rpt from\* to\* once, 2 sc, ch 3, turn; 49 sts.

Pattern Row 1: same as pattern row 1 of dress, but having 12 shells & 13 dc in row, ch 3, turn.

Pattern Rows 2 through 8: Same as pattern row 2 of dress, but having 12 shells & 13 dc in row. Fasten off yarn.

Edging: Join white & work across front with a scallop of \*5 dc's in the ch-1 of shell, 1 sc in next single dc, rpt from\* to corner, continue the same across lower edge of bonnet, skipping enough sts to keep work flat. At end, fasten off yarn, Run narrow baby ribbon through lower edge of cap, leaving ends for ties. Trim side fronts with bows.

### CROCHETED BOOTEES

Commencing at instep(top of foot), ch 5, 1 hdc in 3rd ch from hook, 1 hdc in each of the 2 remaining sts of ch, ch 2, turn.

Rows 2 & 3: 1 hdc in each st; 4 hdc(counting beginning ch 2), end with "chain 24".

Join with sl st to top of first st at opposite end of this row. Make 4 sc along side of instep, 4 sc across front of instep, 4 sc along other side of instep, 1 sc in each of 24 ch sts; 36 sts in rnd, join, ch 2 & turn.

Rnds 1 & 2: 1 hdc in each st around, join, ch 2 & turn.

Rnds 3, 4 & 5: Hdc around, decreasing 1 st at heel & toe end every rnd, 6 sts decreased. Fasten off & sew seam along bottom of sole.

Top: Join wool at center back seam & work 3 rows of pattern (same as in sacque) making 7 shells in rnd, 1 center front & 3 on each side. Fasten off.

Edge: Join white & work 1 row same as last row on sacque. Run ribbon through, tie in bow.

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CROCHETED SOAKERS

Ch 30, 1 hdc in 3rd st from hook, 1 hdc in each of remaining st of ch (29 hdc).

Pattern row 1: Same as dress but having 7 shells & 8 dc in row.

Pattern Row 2: Same as dress but having 7 shells & 8 dc in row.

Rows 3, 4, & 5: Same as row 2.

Row 6: Sl st over first shell to the next dc, shell in next shell, dc in next dc & continue across to 2nd dc from end, make a sl st in this dc, sk last shell, (2 patterns decreased in row).

Row 7: 5 patterns in row.

Row 8: Like Row 6 (2 patterns dec'd in row).

Rows 9, 10 & 11: 3 patterns in each row.

Fasten off. This completes one half of the soaker, make another half to correspond. Seam one side seam, sewing 5 shells of one half to 5 corresponding shells of other half. Seam the 3 shells at lower edge for crotch.

Run fine elastic through the top, fasten. Attach ribbon at top & lower edges of the open side & tie in a bow.

MATERIALS: Continued from page 4

18" baby doll (Sitting Down): Sport yarn & #0 hook for a gauge of 1 shell per inch. This doll has on dress, bonnet, soakers & booties about as the pattern says without variation. When making bonnet, you best fit it on head as you work as mine came out a little small. Just work a few more shell rows in this case.

13" Little girl doll: Baby yarn or Knit-Cro-Sheen & #5 hook with gauge of 2 shells per  $1\frac{1}{2}$ ". Shown on the doll is dress with sleeves & "Panty hose". I especially like this one. Make booties (use 6 shells instead of 7 on top) & continue to crotch for both legs. Put on doll, make sure shells are straight, pin together at crotch. Remove & work around one leg to crotch, skip to other leg, work around it back to crotch. Join & work now in circle to waist. You could continue to underarm & put straps on this for leotards. Could be worked solid instead of in shells also.

17 $\frac{1}{2}$ " Little girl doll (Crissy): Sport yarn or Knit-Cro-Sheen & #2 hook for a gauge of a little less than 1 shell per inch. She has on the dress, without sleeves. Also booties without top shells.

I hope you can see of the many possibilities from this & other patterns. Don't be afraid to experiment & to adapt ideas from other patterns. How about an "empire" style, gather under the bust & more shells below? I do hope you will try these variations.

## CROCHETED HUMPTY DUMPTY

Sent in by Elisabeth Rehm of Jamaica, N.Y.

All of you who write "I just can't crochet" think of this. Miss Rehm is blind & yet she crochets the entire Humpty, having only the face embroidered by someone else. Also she typed the pattern to send to me so I could share it with all of you.

I have made it in different materials to show you the various possible sizes. Miss Rehm's Humpty is the one with the bow and for it, use the following: About 1 oz. of 4 ply Knitting Worsted in color & about  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. in white. Size 0 Steel Hook.

Others, from smallest to largest, use the following:

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Smallest: About #30 Crochet thread, #11 hook  
Next: Knit Cro Sheen, #5 hook  
Next: 3 ply fingering yarn, #2 hook  
Next: 3 ply sport yarn, #2 hook  
Largest: 4 ply knitting worsted, #G hook

## HUMPTY DUMPTY

Special Hints: Always ch 1 & turn at end of each row. Leave an end long enough to sew the seam when you change colors or end off.

BACK: With color, ch 5. Sc in 2nd ch from hook & in each ch across; 4 sc.

Row 2: Sc, Increasing in first & last st.

Rows 3 through 10: Rpt Row 2( 22 sts).

Rows 11 through 21: Sc, without increasing.

Rows 22 through 29: Sc, Decreasing 1 st each end; 6 sts. End off.

FRONT: Work as for back, but changing colors as follows:

Row 11: In 5th st, change to white & in 17<sup>th</sup> st change back to color (I carried color along behind, hooking into it every few sts). Sts divided: 5 color, 12 white, 5 color.

Row 12: Rpt Row 11, only now have 3 color, 16 white & 3 color (carry color along in front this time, so it will be inside).

Continue Humpty now in white, working as for back (work 8 more sc rows before decreasing).

ARM: With color, ch 10, sc in 2nd ch from hook & in each ch across; 9 sts.

Rows 2 through 5: SC.

Row 6: Dec at each end & change to white in last st, break color off.

Rows 7 & 8: Sc on 7 sts, at end of Row 8, instead of ch 1 make 3 loose chains before your turn (for thumb later).

Row 9: Sc.

Row 10: Decrease each end & break off.

FOOT: With color, ch 10. Sc in 2nd ch from hook & in each ch across.

Row 2: Sc, working 3 sc in center st.

Rows 3 & 4: Rpt Row 2 (15 sts)

Row 5: Skip 1 st on both sides of center st.  
(13 sts)

Rows 6 & 7: Rpt Row 5. (9 sts) Knee Cap now made.

Row 8: Sc. At end of this row, change to white. Break off color.

Row 9: Sc

Rows 10 through 15: Sc, working 3 sc in center st (19 sts). Break off.

ASSEMBLING: Most people embroider the face before Property of Ms. Virginia Lakin, NOT FOR RESALE it so that you can do it after. Regular embroider thread, thin crochet cotton or heavy sewing thread can be used.

Sew front to back, stuff before sewing completely. Skimp on stuffing at bottom where you are going to attach feet. Fold arms & feet & sew them, skimp on them also at the opening; this will let them bend when sewn on the body.

Special help: When changing colors, if you work half the sc st in one & then change to other color for last half, you won't have the color or the white "leaking" over into the other part. Example: Yarn over & pull thread through; using other color, yarn over & complete the single crochet.

KNIT HOODED PONCHO - see pg 20 about slacks

Sent in by Mrs. Floyd Martin, Elkhart, Ind. She sent it for the 11½" doll, I added the variations.

For smallest doll (6½" Dawn-type) use baby yarn, #1 & #0 needles.

For 11½" Barby-type, use Knitting Worsted and #8 & #6 needles.

For 17½" Crissy doll use 2 strands Knitting Worsted, #10 & #8 needles.

For Largest doll (18" Chatty Cathy type) use 2 strands Bulky yarn, #13 & #11 needles.  
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Using largest needles, cast on 3 sts.

Row 1: Sl 1, Inc in next st, k to end.

Rpt this row till 28 sts on needle.

Next Row: Sl 1, Inc in next st, k 7, bind off 10, k 8.

Next Row: Sl 1, inc in next st, k 7, cast on 10, k 10. (Neck Hole made)

Front half of poncho now worked, work back half as follows:

Sl 1, k 2 tog, k to end. Rpt this row till 3 sts remain & bind off these 3 sts.

Fringe: Cut yarn in 3" strands (or length needed for your size doll). Loop 1 strand in each st & slip sts thru loop to knot, rpt all around poncho.

HOOD: With smaller needles, starting at center of 10 bound off sts (center front) pick up 11 sts (go to center back, which is center

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## VARIATION ON A KNITTED VEST

From Mrs. Ivy Smith, Melvin, Michigan

She says: Page 20 of your Book 10 is a knit vest pattern. For a lattice pattern, try this pattern with instructions on page 20.

Only change: work on even number of sts.

Row 1: K 2, \*YO, k 2 tog, rpt from\* across row.

Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: K 1, \*YO, k 2 tog, rpt from\* across row, end with k 1.

Row 4: Purl.

Very Beautiful in stripes of different colors. Enclosed is a miniature sample which fits a  $11\frac{1}{2}$ " fashion doll (use 3 ply baby yarn & #3 needles).

of cast on sts). Work this half of hood as follows:

Work 3 rows of k 1, p 1 ribbing, then work 12 rows of stock. st & bind off.

*(20 rows) for Crissy size*  
Repeat for other side of hood. Sew center back & top of hood. Crochet around opening if necessary.

## BARBIE'S CABLE STITCH HAT

From Mrs. Clyde Allen, Springfield, N.S., Can.  
With 3 ply fingering yarn and #2 needles,  
cast on 15 sts.

Row 1: K 1, p 1, k 4, p 1, k 8 (top edge).

Row 2: K 9, p 4, k 2.

Row 3: K 1, p 1, (cable on next 4 sts) p 1,  
k 8. Note: See below for CABLE.

Row 4: K 9, p 4, k 2.

Row 5: K 1, p 1, k 4, p 1, k 8.

Row 6: K 9, k 4, k 2.

Row 7: K 1, p 1, cable on next 4 sts, p 1,  
k 8.

Repeat rows 4, 5, 6 & 7 until hat will go  
around doll's head. Bind off & sew together  
the "cast on" & "bind off" ends. Run a piece  
of yarn through the top edge & draw tightly  
& sew securely for top of hat. Bottom edge  
may be turned up since both sides are alike.

CABLE: Slip 2 sts off on a dp needle, knit  
the next 2 sts & then knit the 2 on the dp  
needle. The dp needle can be held either in  
front or back of work, whichever is easiest,  
but must be held the same way each time so  
the cables run evenly.
